Sticky Knowledge

- Rosa Parks was born in February 1913. She grew up in Montgomery, Alabama in America.
- In the Southern United States at that time, the laws enforced segregation, where black and white people lived very separate lives.
- Rosa was arrested for not giving up her seat to a white man.
- After Rosa's arrest people boycotted the city's buses. (This meant they wouldn't use them)
- After 381 days the Supreme Court ruled that the segregation laws were wrong.

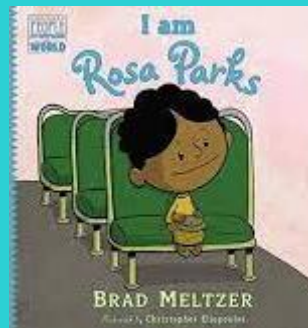
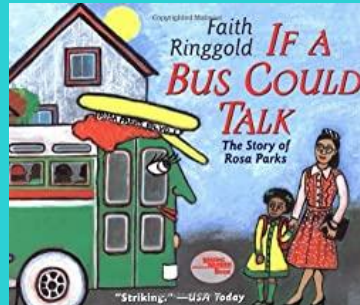
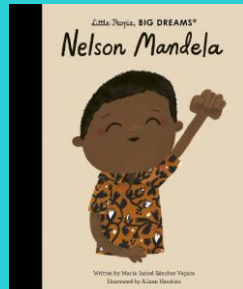

Sticky Knowledge

- Queen Victoria was born on 24th May 1819
- She became queen in June 1837 when she was 18 year old.
- She married prince Albert in 1840 and they had 9 children.
- Prince Albert died in 1861 when the queen was 42 years old. She wore black as a sign of mourning for the rest of her life.
- She was queen of the biggest empire in history.
- She ruled for over 60 years and died in 1901.
- During the Victorian era, the Industrial Revolution was happening – this is when scientific inventions meant that it was easier to make things and that those things could be sent to places further away more quickly and cheaply than before

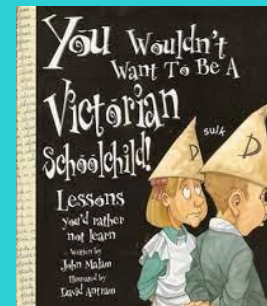
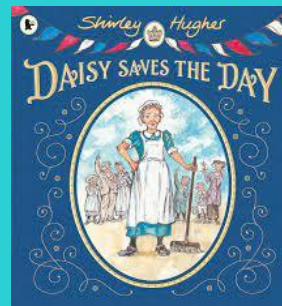
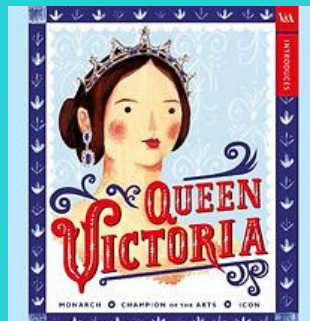

Sticky Knowledge

- Toys have changed over time. Many toys now are made of plastic and need electricity from either batteries or through needing charging.
- There were no computers in schools in the 1970s. Children would watch school TV programmes live on a large television that was wheeled into the classroom.
- Most children would have school dinners. In primary schools they would often have “family service” where an older child would serve everyone on their table. Some foods in the 1970s were cheese flan, stew and dumplings, rice pudding and chocolate concrete with pink custard.
- There were only 3 TV channels and programmes weren’t shown all day.
- Fashion changed greatly in the 1960s and 1970s. In the 1970s flared trousers and platform shoes were popular.

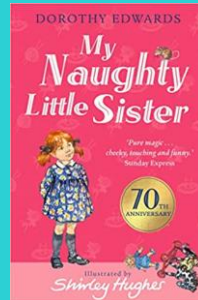
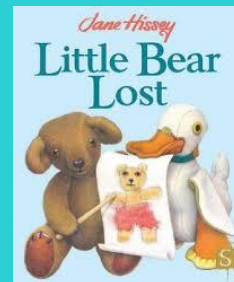
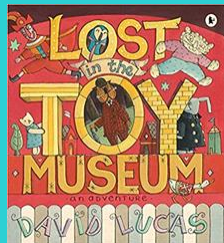
