

Sticky Knowledge

- Latitude and longitude are a system of lines used to describe the location of any place on Earth.
- Lines of latitude run in an east-west direction across Earth. Lines of longitude run in a north-south direction.
- The globe is split into time zones using imaginary lines called meridians. They run from the North Pole to the South Pole. There are 24 time zones.
- The Prime Meridian runs through a place in London called Greenwich. It splits the world into eastern and western hemispheres.
- Ordnance Survey maps use a numbered grid to help locate places on the map.
- Maps use symbols instead of words to label real-life features.

Sticky Knowledge

- Tropical rainforests are found near the equator due to the amount of rainfall and the amount of sunshine these areas receive.
- Most tropical rainforests fall between the Tropic of Cancer and the Tropic of Capricorn.
- The Amazon rainforest in South America is so big that if I were a country, it would be the ninth biggest in the world.
- Rainforests are important because they provide oxygen, medicines, food, wood and minerals.
- Only about 6% of the Earth's land surface is rainforest but about half of all animal and plant species live there.
- Rainforests are in danger because of deforestation by people. This has also endangered many species of animal.
- The Amazon rainforest is home to around 400 different indigenous groups.





Sticky Knowledge

- There are 12 countries in South America and over 400 million people live there
- Brazil is the largest country and covers almost half the continent. It is only slightly smaller than the USA.
- South America's largest river is the Amazon, which is the second longest river in the world. However, the Amazon carries more water than any other river in the world.
- Brasilia is the capital city of Brazil, although Sao Paulo is the largest city with more than 12 million people living there.
- Spanish is the most popular language in South America even though Brazilians speak Portuguese.
- Brazil has six biomes or ecosystems: tropical rainforest, desert, wetlands, savanna, pampas and Atlantic forest
- Many people in Brazil live below the poverty line in favelas or slums on the outskirts of cities.
